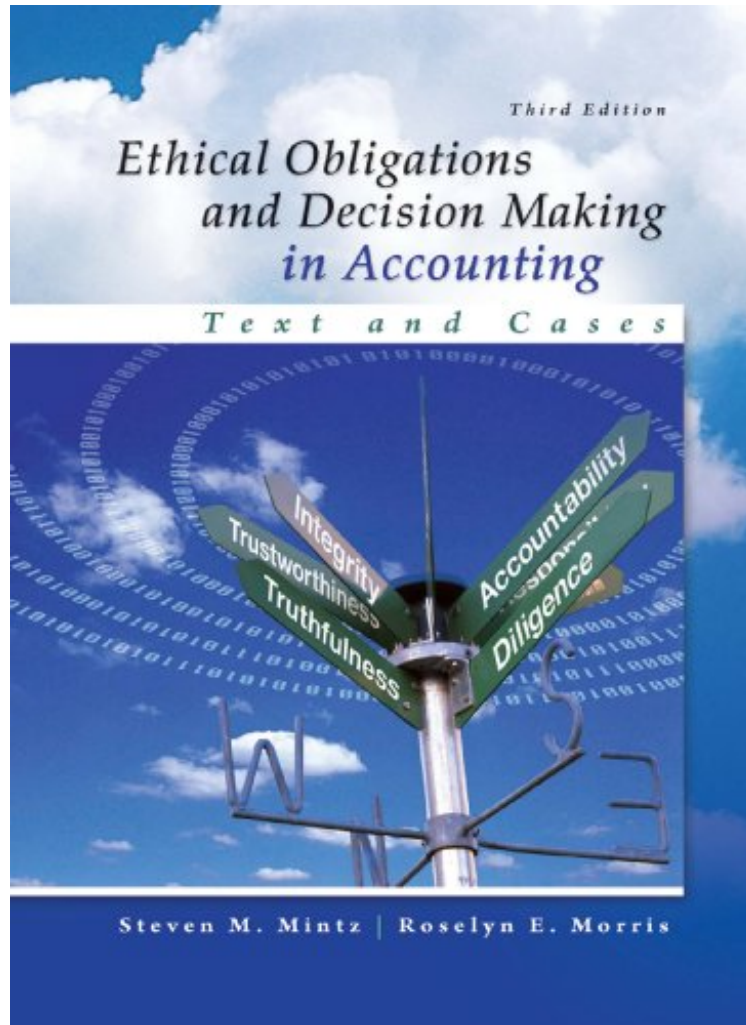

This book is frustratingly difficult to read because there's no proper organization of content. Chapters are long and overloaded with information. Many times I caught myself losing track of what I was trying to learn because the text keeps dragging on, uses too many examples or re-introduces information you've read before in a confusing way. The textbook contains fancy words that only makes the reading difficult. Also, I feel that certain passages in the textbook could have been written in a more simple and concise way, however if that

was the case, the textbook would have been significantly shorter. The textbook is printed in black and white. There are no pictures, just tons of paragraphs crammed in each page (except for boxes of bulleted information). If you're a slow reader or have trouble focusing, this textbook won't suit you. As you progress, the chapters become gradually harder to read and you may require more time to understand it. If you are a fast reader, then you will most likely have no issues. If you don't, good luck.
